- Joppa is the modern city of Tel-Aviv which is connected to the northern part of Joppa and was founded in 1909.
 - Joppa was:
 - A town on the southwest coast of Palestine.
 - Located about forty miles west of Jerusalem.
 - Located on the Plain of Sharon.
 - Located in the area assigned to the tribe of Dan.
 - Joppa is also known as: • Yafo • Japho • Jaffa
 - Joppa is the only natural harbor between Egypt and Haifa.
 - Joppa has been occupied for nearly 3,500 years.
 - Over the centuries, Joppa has been settled by:
 - Egyptians
 - Canaanites
 - Jews
 - Greeks
 - Romans
 - Muslims
 - Crusaders
 - Arabs
 - Zionists
 - The earliest mention of Joppa in the Bible comes in Joshua 19:46, a description of the borders of the inheritance of the tribe of Dan. It reads: "And Mejarkon, and Rakkon, with the border before Japho."

- In building the temple at Jerusalem, Joppa was Solomon's outlet to the sea (**2 Chronicles 2:16**) and later for Zerubbabel as well (**Ezra 3:7**)
- It was the harbor to which Hiram floated fir trees of Mount Lebanon from Tyre. From here they were carried to Jerusalem for use in building the temple.
- **2 Chronicles 2:16**
- After the captivity, trees for the rebuilding of the temple were again brought down in the same manner. **Ezra 3:7**
- Jonah embarked at Joppa when he was trying to go to Tarshish rather than to Nineveh. **Jonah 1:3**
- Dorcas (Tabitha in Aramaic) lived in Joppa. Peter raised her from the dead. As a result many people became followers of Christ. **Acts 9:36-42**
- Peter resided with Simon, the tanner. Here he saw the vision of the great sheet being let down from Heaven. **Acts 9:43**
- From here Peter was summoned to go with the servants of Cornelius to Caesarea. **Acts 10:17-23**
- Note: James T Barclay, the first missionary supported by the churches of Christ in America, arrived in Joppa in 1851 and then went on to Jerusalem to live and work for several years.
